

◇ University Overview

Established in 1949, today Saitama University is composed of five undergraduate faculties and four graduate schools. The education seminar also participates in the United

Graduate School of Education's research seminars (post-graduate courses) that have been established at Tokyo Gakugei University.

Saitama City, where Saitama University is located, is part of the Tokyo metropolitan area. The university is 30km north of Tokyo, which can be reached in one hour by train. Saitama is well served by excellent transportation facilities, lending to its reputation as a very livable residential city. Saitama is blessed with a rich, green environment, and the city also actively promotes soccer and a variety of other sports activities.

The program seeks to provide students with adequate professional competence in education at school, by instructing and assisting students through theoretical and practical research and training, while maintaining a broad perspective concerning humanity, society and nature. Visiting instructors from each area provide tutorials on specialized content corresponding to the goals of teacher training students, by utilizing the characteristics of the Graduate School of Education.

The Faculty of Education on which the program is based seeks to foster human resources who possess a global perspective and knowledge concerning "human growth, development and existence" while enhancing advanced, specialized capabilities based on an educational system that clarifies distinctive majors of study.

◇ Outline of the Course

(1) Preparatory Japanese Language Education

a) Basic course

Teacher training students may attend classes in reading and writing Japanese and on various aspects of Japanese affairs that are offered as General Education.

b) Supplementary courses

Teacher training students may also attend supplementary Japanese-language courses on education at the Center for International Exchange, corresponding to each individual's lecturer level.

(2) Specialized instruction

a) Format

Participants in the school's education seminar will pursue research under instructors' guidance, taking into consideration each individual's own interests

b) Course subjects in English

All courses are taught in Japanese; no English-language courses are available.

c) Other instruction

Participants may also attend lectures held by the faculty depending on their goals.

◇ Accommodations

Saitama University's International House includes 98 rooms for single students, 55 rooms for married couples and 19 rooms for families, and can accommodate about 170 individuals.



■ Characteristics

Shiga University has two campuses. The Graduate School of Economics is in Hikone Campus and the Graduate School of Education is in Otsu Campus.

The Graduate School of Education at Shiga University is comprised of three fields of specialization : School Education, Special Education and Subject Studies. The Otsu Campus is located near the southern end of Lake Biwa. There are many cultural events and historic spots in and around Otsu.

■ Characteristics of the Program

The Graduate School of Shiga University is placing emphases on studies in teaching methodology, lesson analysis and curriculum development on primary education, secondary education and teacher education. Shiga University, situated at the shore of Lake Biwa, has historically strong research backgrounds in environmental sciences education, community environmental studies and Limnology. Students particularly wishing to study in these areas is encouraged to apply for the program.

(1) Preparatory Japanese Language Classes

2011.10~2012.3

For the first six months in Japan foreign students will study basic Japanese in preparation for the academic work at Japanese Language institute designated by MEXT.

2012.4~2013.3

Foreign students will occasionally be offered supplementary Japanese Language courses at the Faculty of Education.

(2) Course work and Language of Instruction

2012.4~2013.3

Each student will major in one of the fields of specialization offered by the Graduate School of Education. Students will attend classes, seminars and lectures in their field of study, as well as other related fields. Under the guidance of their faculty advisors they will participate in various academic activities such as supervised practice teaching, visiting various schools and institutes, etc. In general the language of instruction will be Japanese, but when necessary, assistance in English will be provided by their advisors.

◇Accommodation

■ On Campus accommodation : The Faculty of Education has a dormitory for undergraduate and graduate students at which foreign students studying at the Otsu campus may board. 28 single rooms for men and 39 single rooms for women. The monthly rent is about ¥15,000 including utilities. Sharing bathroom and kitchen.

■ Off-campus accommodation : Many apartments available for rent near Campus. (within 10 minutes walk) The monthly rent is about ¥40,000 ~¥50,000 including management charge.

The campus is close to supermarkets, banks, post office and convenience store. The campus is about 10 minutes from the nearest JR station by public bus.







The University consists of eight faculties scattered over five campuses, Matsumoto, Nagano, Ueda, and Minamiminowa. All faculties have attached Graduate Schools. Shinshu University Video and Data Network Systems is a network system which connects the five campuses with each other. By using this system, intercampus classes can be held.

For example, the Faculty of Education has eleven majors and 6 attached schools for teacher training and research. Also it has the Center for Educational Research and Training and the Institute of Nature Education in Shiga Heights and provides characteristic studies. (1)Japanese language education

①Basic course

The International Centre provides 15-week Japanese language basic courses at 4 levels from beginners to upper intermediate. 8 to 10 classes (one class 90 minutes) per week are given with an emphasis on how to communicate in Japanese in beginners classes, and on advancing Japanese language ability in upper classes.

②Supplementary course

Japanese language supplementary courses are offered in three campuses, Nagano (Engineering), Ueda and Minamiminowa to international students at Shinshu University. Students of the "Teacher Training Program" may attend the course to improve their Japanese. Two classes (one class 90 minutes) per week are available starting from the mid-April to the beginning of February.

(2)Specialized training

①Course, type of teaching, etc.

Mentor supervises research depending on students' interest. We have no class in English.

Students are provided with opportunities to get in contact with other international students.

We do not permit the official credit. We make a field trip to some places worth visiting (once a year) and plan other activities for international students at Shinshu University.





Tokyo Gakugei University is located in Koganei-shi, 30 minutes by train from Shinjuku. Although the university is in Tokyo, it has an environment of lush greenery.

Tokyo Gakugei University is a university of education established in 1949 unifying four normal schools. It has produced able educators nationwide. In 1988, in addition to the teacher training courses a new Liberal Art Course was added in an attempt to educate a wider range of students who wish to contribute to society outside the field of education. In 1996, the united graduate school of education (Doctoral Course) was started to produce researchers centering on school education.

Tokyo Gakugei University has affiliations with 13 schools, including schools for children with disabilities. 

◇ University overview

1. Characteristics and history:

Tokyo University of Foreign Studies (TUFS) is the oldest educational establishment in Japan's history of international cultural exchange and its history goes back over 150 years (the Edo era). The immediate predecessor of the university was Tokyo School of Foreign Languages established in 1899, which gained a high reputation for its unparalleled contribution to cross-cultural exchange and foreign language teaching in Japan.

In 1949, under the educational reform carried out after the Second World War, the school was renamed Tokyo University of Foreign Studies. The curriculum of TUFS is designed to integrate language study with courses in international affairs to enable students to gain a broad and well-balanced understanding of the countries or areas of their specialization.

At present, TUFS consists of the intramural institutions such as the Faculty of Foreign Studies, the Graduate School of Global Studies with Master's and Doctoral programs, the Japanese Language Center for International Students, and the Research Institute for Languages and Cultures of Asia and Africa. Among Japanese institutions of higher learning, the university is unique in the specialized training and education in areas such as foreign languages, foreign cultures, and international relations.

◇ Outline of the course for Teacher Training students

1. Features of the program

In this program students will receive special academic training to achieve their research goal while they strive to brush up their Japanese according to their proficiency.

2. Acceptance capacity : 10 students

3. Japanese language education

As necessary, Japanese Language Center for International Students provides teacher training students with "Japanese Language Program of TUFS" at eight proficiency levels for six months to a year and a half.

4. Professional education

Students draw up their own research plan under the guidance of supervisor to suit their needs, and they produce teaching materials or reports as a completion assignment through a year and a half.

Besides these activities, students will attend a training program for in-service native Japanese teachers, visit primary/secondary schools in neighborhood to observe classes, and work together to teach global understanding. In addition, students may participate in the classes of Japan studies or Japanese teaching method in the Faculty of Foreign Studies and the Graduate School.

5. Other Activities

The program offers a platform to exchange information with in-service native Japanese teachers as well as training of Japanese cultural studies.

◇ Accommodations

Although the university provides the International Halls on the premises for foreign student accommodation, it does not necessarily mean everyone can get lodgings. If students are unable to get accommodation, the Japan Student Services Organization can introduce them to other alternative lodging facilities.

Each room comes furnished with a single bed, desk with drawers, chair, bookshelves, shelves for clothes, and shoes, a small kitchen area with stove, refrigerator, sink, telephone and internet (Ethernet) connection, waste basket, several lighting fixtures and a desk lamp, an air filter, and an air conditioner/heater.

Monthly rent for a single room, including common area fee, is currently ¥17,700. Students also have to pay for utility services such as electricity, water, and gas.

Located in a fast developing but quiet western suburb of Tokyo with access to several train and bus lines, the campus is surrounded by a wealth of greenery and nature including several large and beautiful parks, river areas, and many sports fields. Basic shopping such as convenience stores, small supermarkets, and several restaurants are within walking distance.
