Participating areas

•About 100 secondary school students from the three prefectures of Fukushima, Miyagi and Iwate who were victims of the disaster take part. The participant members are fixed and activities will continue for 2.5 years.

 Participants will form teams and receive guidance from local leaders.

•Recovery of the areas the pupils come from will be examined from their own perspective.

•Support teams of undergraduate and graduate university students



OECD Tohoku School activities

Intensive Workshops

5 intensive workshops held (about a week), various teachers conduct experience activities and discussions

Local schools

Area schools held in each area for youngsters to plan and implement area rehabilitation according to their local situation

Themed activities

Activities conducted to make the Paris event a success: "scenarios," "industrygovernment-academia collaboration," "communications and PR," "selfdocumentaries"
