- 2. Your application should be concise and informative, not exceeding the word limits for each question. Focus on key points and concrete actions that showcase your city's lifelong learning initiatives. Please include statistics to demonstrate achievements, supported by references such as policy documents, publications, reports and web links. You may also submit supporting materials, including illustrations, case studies or videos. All documents must be in English, French or Spanish. If submitted in another language, a translation into one of these three languages is required.
- 3. Once your city has completed Part 1 of this form, email it to your country's National Commission for UNESCO, copying in the GNLC Coordination Team (learningcities@unesco.org) at the UNESCO Institute for Lifelong Learning (UIL). For National Commission contact details, please visit the Database of National Commissions for UNESCO.
- 4. Once the National Commission for UNESCO has endorsed your membership by signing the application (Part 2), it will forward the complete application to the GNLC Coordination Team at UIL (learningcities@unesco.org) and send a copy to you.
