The 4th Asia-Pacific Leadership Academy for School Principals

1. Background

Globalization, usually viewed as an inevitable and intrinsic characteristic of the 21st century, is being touted by some as a powerful force for peace. However, paradoxically, as this worldwide phenomenon accelerated points of interaction among cultures through migration and mass media, it has also given rise to, if not exacerbated, ethnic frictions, attitudes of intolerance and identity-linked violence within and across societies. Defining peace as the absence of war is therefore clearly inadequate; peace should rather be defined as the genuine practice of values of equality, respect and understanding among peoples. It is in this regard that education plays a critical task in constructing the defenses of genuine peace in the minds of men to safeguard the lives of future generations.

While education lies mostly on the hands of teachers, its effectiveness and potential reach also rely heavily upon the nature of the school administration, environment and curriculums. APCEIU, guided by its UNESCO mandate, therefore firmly believes that school leadership truly assumes an indispensable role in making school contexts conducive to the learning of other cultures, appreciation of the other, and learning of universal values of mutual respect, human rights and equality. Acting upon this conviction, APCEIU has been holding the Asia-Pacific Leadership Academy for School Principals (APLASP) since 2010 to enhance the competencies of school principals to implement Education for International Understanding (EIU) in their respective schools, a measure to help societies effectively cope with the challenges to peace brought about by globalization.

Now on its fourth year, APLASP aims to provide school principals from the Asia-Pacific region opportunities to internalize the values underpinning EIU through interactive workshops and cultural immersions, as well as those that help foster their international school networks through the school fair and school visits. It is expected after the workshop that EIU will make school leaders become enthusiastic in creating school networks, intensifying the channels of mutual understanding across different societies, and ultimately facilitating the growth of the Culture of Peace in the Asia-Pacific region.

- * Asia-Pacific Centre of Education for International Understanding (APCEIU) is a UNESCO Category II Centre, established in 2000, to promote Education for International Understanding (EIU) towards a Culture of Peace in the Asia-Pacific region.
- * Education for International Understanding (EIU) is a holistic and multi-dimensional education initiative to promote a Culture of Peace. Interchangeably named as global education, international education, peace education or global citizenship education in various contexts, EIU is anchored on genuine peace, transcending the concept of peace merely as the absence of war. It advocates participatory democracy, human rights and dignity, social and economic equity, ecological sustainability, and peaceful reconciliation of conflicts.

EIU is based on the UNESCO Recommendation concerning Education for International Understanding, Co-operation and Peace and Education relating to Human Rights and

Fundamental Freedoms (1974), UNESCO Declaration and Integrated Framework of Action on Education for Peace, Human Rights and Democracy (1995), and the UN International Decade for the Culture of Peace (2001-2010); and its development has integrated various relevant international instruments including the UN Decade of Education for Sustainable Development (2005-2014).

2. Objectives

- To provide a forum through which participants can comprehend key educational issues and recognize the importance of education in fostering a Culture of Peace;
- To support participants in identifying effective strategies to promote and implement EIU in their local contexts;
- To provide a platform for creating and sustaining networks among schools to help strengthen mutual understanding across societies in the Asia-Pacific region.

3. Expected Outcomes

- Enhance the capacity of participants to play a crucial role in promoting EIU in their own school, organization, community, country, and region;
- Create and expand networks of schools and school administrators in the region to strengthen educational programs related to EIU;
- Promote leadership for effective management of education in the 21st century that emphasizes the value of Learning to Live Together (LTLT).
- Support the formation of sister school affiliations between schools in Seoul and in other Asia-Pacific countries.

Furthermore, there will be <u>no daily allowance (per diem)</u> provided by APCEIU. For any extended stays beyond the workshop period, the participants are responsible for all the expenses.

*Twin sharing basis accommodation refers to two (2) persons per (1) room. This room arrangement is made in order to further enrich the interactions among the participants. Please bear in mind that APCEIU will not cover participants who wish to occupy single bed rooms during the workshop.

Key Guiding Questions:	 What are the qualities/attributes that students need to acquire in the 21st century? Why are these qualities/attributes important for my students? How can I, as school leader, provide an education mechanism that can help my students acquire those qualities/attributes? 	
Session Notes:	Volunteering participants will identify a major school programme in line with their school management principle and will be given 20 minutes to present their ideas. The presentation may explain why and how the programme contributes to cultivate the qualities/attributes that their students need to possess to become global citizens in the 21 st century. Possible topics may be relevant but not limited to: - caring for others - tolerance for diversity - human right awareness - peace-building

	The main goal of the school fair is to provide participants opportunities to learn more about the schools of their counterparts in Asia-Pacific countries. It is expected that increased knowledge, understanding and appreciation would result to the signing of new school exchange programs among the participants.	
Session Notes:	One or two tables will be provided to each participant to help them display representative items, materials and information about their school, thereby helping them introduce their schools to their coparticipants, visiting principals, teachers, students and other visitors. Each participant too will be assigned one Korean student to assist in setting up, maintaining and arranging their exhibition tables. This arrangement can also allow the participants to examine their counterparts' exhibitions during the school fair without worrying of leaving their exhibition tables behind. To enrich the interactions in the school fair, participants are encouraged to come up to the corner stage and share their stories about their students, school, communities or culture possibly in the form oratory speeches, cultural performances and creative storytelling.
